# USIP JENNINGS RANDOLPH FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

This book is a fine example of the work produced by senior fellows in the Jennings Randolph fellowship program of the United States Institute of Peace. As part of the statute establishing the Institute, Congress envisioned a program that would appoint “scholars and leaders of peace from the United States and abroad to pursue scholarly inquiry and other appropriate forms of communication on international peace and conflict resolution.” The program was named after Senator Jennings-Randolph of West Virginia, whose efforts over four decades helped establish the Institute.

Since 1987, the Jennings Randolph Program has played a key role in the Institute’s effort to build a national center of research, dialogue, and education on critical problems of conflict and peace. Fellows come from a wide variety of academic and other professional backgrounds. They conduct research at the Institute and participate in USIP’s outreach activities to policymakers, the academic community, and the American public.

The Institute awards between eight and twelve senior fellowships each year. Fellowship recipients are selected after a rigorous, multistage review that includes consideration by independent experts and professional staff at the Institute. The final authority for decisions regarding Senior Fellowship awards rests with USIP’s board of directors. The Jennings Randolph Program also awards Peace Scholar dissertation fellowships to students at U.S. universities who are researching and writing doctoral dissertations on conflict and international peace and security issues.
